READ ACTS 7:48-50, 58 AND ACTS 17:22-25

In Acts 7, Stephen preaches a powerful sermon and we are introduced to a man named Saul who later becomes Paul. Can you identify the similar words in Acts 17? Did you see Stephen's very words repeated by Paul years later? Stephen's story had such an impact!

GUIDANCE

The similar words we find are "The Most High does not dwell in houses made by hands" which Stephen said and "Lord of heaven and earth does not live in temples made by human hands" spoken by Paul. We can't know how Stephen's words and his death as a martyr truly impacted Saul, but we do know he meets Jesus. is changed dramatically and goes on to write at least 13 books of the New Testament, which has in turn impacted each one of our lives. The words we say today could have eternal significance; they could be the reason someone asks deep questions or even rethinks what they believe. The ripple effect of our words and loving actions endures for generations.

2 READ JOHN 1:35-42, MARK 2:2-5 AND MARK 8:22

Why is it that people who have met Jesus often bring their friends and family to meet Jesus? Have you ever done the same by sharing your story of meeting Jesus with a friend or family member?

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In John. Andrew meets Jesus then finds his brother Peter and brings him to Jesus. In Mark 2, a paralytic's friends bring him to Jesus and eventually lower him through the roof. In Mark 8, others bring a blind man and beg Jesus to touch him. We have been rescued! Meeting Jesus fills us with hope and, because we love our family and friends, we want to share that hope. Telling others about Jesus or praying for them (bringing them to Jesus in *prayer*) is a spontaneous overflow of our own grateful hearts. The best thing that could ever happen to someone is for them to know Jesus

READ ALOUD JEREMIAH 9:23-24

What does this passage say relative to a believer's story? How is this different from the way the world defines a success story?

GUIDANCE

A believer's story is that they have met Jesus, that they can say they know God and have experienced His steadfast love. Reference John 17:3 "This is eternal life that they know you. the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent." It's amazing to think that God desires a personal relationship with each of us. It's reassuring to know our relationship with Jesus doesn't depend on our own wisdom, strength or riches. The world's idea of success is often related to an individual's level of education. status, influence, power or wealth.

READ PHILIPPIANS 3:20 AND HEBREWS 12:1-2

How do these verses mentioning heaven, citizenship and a cloud of witnesses influence our story of faith and help us find hope?

GUIDANCE

In God's grand story, through hundreds of years, He has used his Church to change history, bring salvation and restore hope. Countless heroes of the faith have gone before us and we will leave a legacy to those after us. We can develop an eternal perspective as a way of seeing our lives as part of God's redemptive story. Everyone is destined for eternity; we are better together when we remind one another of this truth.
